The Starting Point

Or should that be the starting block? We have been thoroughly taken with this simple geometric form of a cube and all that it represents for this inaugural art project — Cure³.

From the outset of this project with The Cure Parkinson's Trust, in partnership with Bonhams and The David Ross Foundation, we wanted to come up with a formula for a selling exhibition that was both unique and inviting for the artists, and desirable and collectable for the buyers. Artists constantly

receive requests to give work to benefit charities, and we as curators and producers of exhibitions are acutely aware of this. We therefore wanted to avoid making this project yet another 'Charity Auction.'

With this project we saw the potential to be creative with a new concept, one that would provide freedom to the invited artists and, at the same time, by virtue of implementing a consistent format, create a unified and unique exhibition.

Over 20 years ago, Susie Allen, Founding Director of Artwise, originated the concept of the RCA Secret Postcard project for the Royal College of Art. It is now widely recognised as one of the art world's most successful fundraising strategies, having raised millions for the university. We took this formula forward, and, instead of the postcard, we are giving our artists a cube that represents a space within which to work — a platform, a framework. The dimensions were much debated, but 20cm³ provided the magic proportions. We ordered beautiful bespoke acrylic cubes for our artists and gave them the option to have a white base on a plinth or that could act as a 'canvas' and hung on a wall if desired.

The cube is also inspired by the charity, The Cure Parkinson's Trust, whose quest it is to think 'outside the box' in order to push the boundaries of medical research to find a cure for Parkinson's. Tom Isaacs, a Parkinson's sufferer himself, talks about the condition as a 'sentence without parole' and the feeling of being 'boxed in.' The cube itself therefore symbolises feeling boxed in and being able to break free: to go beyond the confines of those walls, be creative, and think differently.

Ultimately, it was important that the given space inspired the artists, as we wanted them to have fun, to play with it, and to create something new and unique. Their response has been incredible, as you can see by the calibre of the artists participating and from the resulting exhibition at Bonhams. The Cure³ artworks have exceeded all expectations. For some, the walls of the cube have become the sculpture itself: covered, melted, printed, or painted upon. For others, it became a space to contain and showcase a special object or installation. We kept the brief open, and the result is a collection of artworks that shows strength in form: the creative responses are vast, but the cause and space unites them.

Artwise carefully selected these artists: our ambitions were not only to show leading names in the British art world, but also to introduce younger artists who we believe are making headway in the art world, and whose works already reside in important collections. We did, however, cast our net wider than the UK, and have participating artists from India, USA, France, Germany, Italy, and Iceland.


At the heart of this project is the potential to raise funds for an extremely worthy cause, which is only possible if people buy the artworks. We hope that by virtue of their diminutive and collectable size, and the accessible price range, the Cure³ cubes will

find good homes with collectors both new and established.

We extend a sincere thank you to all of the artists who have generously embraced our invitation and given their time to produce such collectable works. We also thank the galleries involved who facilitated the commissioning process and supported their artists to contribute.

We would like to thank all the members of the Cure³ Committee, whose passion and guidance have been invaluable throughout this project. We are grateful to Bonhams and their fantastic staff for their endless patience and generosity, and to the David Ross Foundation, who have supported this project from the outset. We give a special mention to Simona Pizzi, who jumped aboard the Artwise team to project manage the extensive logistics involved. Finally, we especially thank Maya Binkin, the 'seamstress' who has pieced together this wonderful tapestry of partners.

We believe that this is very much a starting point for an art project that has huge potential to develop, flourish, and establish itself as a powerful fundraiser for a serious and worthy cause.

Rebecca Ackroyd's work excavates the remains of an object and reconstructs it into something new. She creates works that reflect a history and yet also exist between places, becoming simultaneously familiar and unknown. By shifting the scale of her figurative works, they appear to meander through space, producing breathing structures that inhabit and divide a room. Her smaller works invite a more intimate encounter, reflecting the oscillation between global and individual desire, and create a framework within which to exist or build meaning.

Anglo-French artist Alice Anderson studied Fine Art at Goldsmiths College, London. Her practice is an exploration of memory in the context of the digital world via Cor-ten and thread sculptures, drawings, and performances. Anderson transforms virtual data into tactile forms to recreate a new physical relationship with objects and spaces through ritual performances. "... When one of the objects around me is likely to become obsolete or is lost in stream of our lives, I 'memorise' it with thread before it happens...".

Anderson has had solo exhibitions at the Eiffel Historical Building (2016); Espace Culturel Louis Vuitton (2015); Wellcome Collection (2014); Whitechapel Art Gallery (2012); and Freud Museum, (2011). Selected group projects include Saatchi Gallery, Champagne Life-Emerging Woman Artists, London, 2016; Summer Exhibition, Royal Academy of Arts (2016); 55th International Art Exhibition – la Biennale di Venezia (2013); and Elles Centre Pompidou (2011).





An industrial designer, architect, and artist, Ron Arad's constant experimentation with the possibilities of materials such as steel, aluminium, and polyamide, and his radical re-conception of the form and structure of furniture, has put him at the forefront of contemporary design.

His public art commissions include Vortext in Seoul, Korea; Kesher at Tel Aviv University; Evergreen in Tokyo; and Curtain Call for Roundhouse, London. His Spyre was the Courtyard Commission at the Royal Academy of Arts in London in 2016. Arad's designs have won numerous awards, and his work can be found in the permanent collections of museums worldwide,

Shoplifter's work explores the use and symbolic nature of hair, and its visual and artistic potential. She uses traditional handcraft techniques like crocheting, weaving, and braiding to create new forms of textiles, while referring to established methods in art. She is attracted to the playfulness found in Pop art, folk art, the naïf, and handicraft, all of which strongly influence her organic process of creating work.

She has been awarded the Nordic Award in Textiles (2015), and took part in the 2015 Nordic Biennial. Shoplifter has produced commissioned work for Queensland Gallery of Modern Art (2016), and

a clothing collection for '& other stories.' In 2008, her large-scale installation of brightly coloured synthetic hair filled the window of MoMA, New York, in collaboration with assume vivid astro focus. Tony Bevan is widely known for figurative work that is characterised by the use of expressive lines and imbued with psychological intensity. As well as his recognisable depictions of the human head, he has also addressed architectural subjects and nature in his bold and distinctive style.

His solo exhibitions include Matts Gallery, London (1982); ICA, London and touring (1987); Whitechapel Art Gallery, London (1993); IVAM Institut Valencia d'Art Modern, Spain (2006); and Cartwright Hall Art Gallery, Bradford (2016). His works are in the permanent collections of such museums as IVAM, Valencia;

Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; MoMA, New York; Pinacothek der Modern, Munich; and Tate Galleries, London.





Known as the Godfather of British Pop Art, Peter Blake's works reflect his fascination with all streams of popular culture and the beauty found in everyday objects. Many of his works feature found objects and printed materials such as photographs, comic strips, and advertising texts. Renowned for his collaborations with the music industry, he has produced iconic album covers for The Beatles (most famously *Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band*), Paul Weller, The Who, and Oasis.

His recent exhibitions include *Portraits and People* at Waddington Custot Galleries (2016), and recent commissions include *Dazzle Ship* for Tate Liverpool and

the Liverpool Biennial (2015). In 2012 he redesigned the Brit Award, and he has received the commission to paint a canvas of St Martin of the Knights Chapel in St Paul's Cathedral — the first new artist to be commissioned for several hundred years. In 2014, he exhibited his complete set of illustrations inspired by *Under Milk Wood* at the National Museum of Cardiff. Retrospectives of Blake's work were held at the Tate Gallery in 1983 and Tate Liverpool in 2008.



Willard Boepple's full-size sculptures are influenced by commonplace functional objects that have a relationship to the scale of the human body. Indeed, most of his works take as their point of departure considerations such as the dimensions of the intervals of a ladder's rungs, scaled to an average step, or the dimensions of a shelf designed to hold things scaled to the hand. Our subliminal awareness of these relationships humanises Boepple's work.

He has exhibited widely in New York and abroad, and his work can be found in the permanent collections of the Metropolitan Museum of Art; the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; the Storm King Art Center; and The Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge, UK. Rob and Nick Carter have been collaborating for over fifteen years as a husband and wife artistic duo. They explore the potential of light, colour, and form through the mediums of camera-less photography, painting, installation, neon, sculpture, and time-based media. Their works push the boundaries of and between each of these media, resulting in creations that defy simple definition.

Their exhibitions include Masterworks in Dialogue, Stäadel Museum, Frankfurt (2016); Transforming, Museum of Contemporary Art, Virginia (2015); Chinese Whispers, The Fine Art Society Contemporary, London (2015);

Masterpieces of Dutch Painting from the Mauritshuis, The Frick Collection (2013/14); and Drawing with Light, Victoria and Albert Museum (2011). The Mauritshuis in The Hague, The Frans Hals Museum in Haarlem, and The Victoria and Albert Museum in London hold Rob and Nick Carter's work in their collections.

Juliana Cerqueira Leite is a Brazilian-American sculptor based in Brooklyn. Her work investigates how the human body is measured, defined, and asserts itself in the physical world through its relationship to space. Focusing on the capabilities and limitations of her own body, she employs repetitive movements and physical exertion to visceral effect. All of her works are self-portraits, but not in the classic sense. She laboriously interacts with materials such as clay, plaster, and rubber, directly impressing and casting her body in motion.

Cerqueira Leite graduated from the Slade School of Fine Art MFA in London in 2006, where she received the Kenneth Armitage Sculpture Prize. More recently, she was awarded 2016's Furla Art Prize for her contribution to the 5th Moscow Young Art Biennial. Her work has appeared in group shows at the Saatchi Gallery, London, Duve Gallery, Berlin, the Vancouver Biennial, Cass Sculpture Foundation, and Marres House for Contemporary Culture in Maastricht. Having spent his childhood partly in Canada and partly in Trinidad, Doig's paintings may appear as remembrances of his youth. His work contains biographical, literary, theatrical, or filmic details, but his ultimate concern is the placement of pigment on canvas and how the painted image resonates beyond language.

Doig was nominated for the Turner Prize in 1994. That same year, he received the Prix Eliette von Karajan, and in 2008 he was awarded the Wolfgang Hahn Prize of the Society for Modern Art, Museum Ludwig, Icon Award. Damien Hirst studied Fine Art at Goldsmiths College. Whilst in his second year, he conceived and curated the group exhibition, Freeze, a show that launched not only Hirst, but a generation of British artists. Since the late 1980s, Hirst has used a varied practice of installation, sculpture, painting, and drawing to explore the complex relationships between art, beauty, religion, science, life, and death. His work investigates and challenges contemporary belief systems, and dissects the uncertainties at the heart of human experience.

Since 1987, over 90 solo Damien Hirst exhibitions have taken place worldwide, and he has been included in over 300 group shows. In 2012, London's Tate Modern presented a major retrospective survey of his work in conjunction with the 2012 Cultural Olympiad. His work features in major collections, including Tate Collection; Museum of Modern Art, New York; Fondazione Prada; Astrup Fearnley Museum, and the Broad Art Foundation. He was awarded the Turner Prize in 1995.





For Cure³, Henry Hudson collaborated with his ceramicist brother Richard WM Hudson. Henry makes paintings, sculpture, etchings, and performance-based work but is best recognised for his use of plasticine, creating paintings that have depth and a sculptural quality. Using this comical, childish medium, Hudson's work explores macabre or vulnerable social stereotypes to create satirical social commentaries. His most recent body of work, also a collaboration with his brother, explored the tropical fauna of dense jungle scenes in a spectrum of colour rendered in plasticine and painted ceramics.

Hudson has had solo exhibitions in New York, London, Hong Kong, and Beijing and his work is in many international private collections. Richard Hudson (b.1980) has ceramic works in the permanent collection of the Victoria and Albert Museum and has exhibited throughout Europe.

Paul Huxley's best-known works are strongly coloured abstract paintings that often make a play between flat surfaces and spatial illusions. His earliest works, the Fluid Series, earned him wide recognition in The New Generation exhibition at the Whitechapel Art Gallery (1964). He lived and worked in New York in the mid 1960s. Upon his return to London, he painted several more series of paintings developing the metaphysical possibilities of a divided canvas.

Huxley's works are held in many museums in the UK and around the world, including the Tate Gallery, London, and the Museum of Contemporary Art, Sydney. He exhibited a room of large wall paintings in the 56th International Art Exhibition – la Biennale di Venezia (2015), and his most recent solo shows have been in the Mark Rothko Art Centre, Latvia, and the David Richard Gallery, Santa Fe (2016). He has also made sculpture during the last eight years and exhibited three of them at the RA Summer Exhibition in 2016.





Alison Jackson is a BAFTA and multi-award-winning contemporary artist who explores the cult of celebrity, an extraordinary phenomenon created by the media and publicity industries. Jackson makes convincingly realistic work about celebrities doing things in private using lookalikes. Likeness becomes real, and fantasy touches on the believable. She creates scenarios we have all imagined, but never actually seen — the images that mobile phones and the media can't get. Jackson raises questions about whether we can believe what we see when we live in a world of manufactured images created by the media and celebrities and mediated by screens

and the Internet. She comments on our voyeurism, on the power and seductive nature of imagery, and on our need to believe.

Jackson works across all media and arts platforms, from television to social media, and is widely exhibited in galleries and museums. Most recently, Jackson wrote and directed the opera La Trashiata for the Edinburgh Fringe Festival.

Ben Johnson's main subject matter is architecture, cityscapes, and the interplay of light and space. He is currently focusing on Islamic architecture. He makes paintings using acrylic on canvas and also makes prints, drawings and, occasionally, sculptures.




Drawing inspiration from the history of art and music, as well as key philosophical and theological texts, Idris Khan investigates memory, creativity, and the layering of experience. Rachel Kneebone's intricate works address and question the human condition: renewal, transformation, life cycles, and the experience of inhabiting the body. Sarah Lucas is one of the leading figures of the generation of young British artists who emerged during the 1990s. After studying at the Working Men's College and London College of Printing, she attended Goldsmith's College, where she participated in the seminal 1988 group show Freeze. This was followed by two solo shows in London in 1992, and her 1993 collaboration with Tracey Emin: The Shop, Bethnal Green Road. She has since exhibited and held residencies internationally. The work of Julian Opie is known throughout the world. His distinctive formal language is instantly recognisable and reflects his artistic preoccupation with the idea of representation, and the means by which images are perceived and understood.

Taking influence from classical portraiture, Egyptian hieroglyphs and Japanese woodblock prints, as well as public signage, information boards, and traffic signs, the artist connects the clean visual language of modern life with the fundamentals of art history.

He has exhibited in major museums and galleries around the world, as well as participating in the Delhi Triennial,

Venice Biennial, and Documenta. Permanent public artworks can be seen in Hong Kong, London, Luxembourg, Taipei, Calgary, and Indianapolis. His works are included in many public art collections, among them Tate and National Portrait Gallery in London; MoMA in New York; The Israel Museum in Jerusalem; and Takamatsu City Museum of Art in Japan.





Perry works with traditional media: ceramics, cast iron, bronze, printmaking, and tapestry. His works reference his own childhood and life as a transvestite, while also engaging with wider social issues from class and politics to sex and religion.

Perry has had numerous major solo exhibitions, including Tomb of the Unknown Craftsman at the British Museum (2011), My Pretty Little Art Career at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Sydney (2016), and The Vanity of Small Differences, a suite of tapestries currently on a national and international tour led by the Arts Council Collection and British Council.

Perry won the Turner prize in 2003, and was awarded a CBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours List in 2013. In 2015, he was appointed Trustee of the British Museum and Chancellor of the University of the Arts London, and in 2016, Perry was awarded a RIBA Honorary Fellowship for The House for Essex designed by Perry and FAT Architecture.

Cathie Pilkington is a sculptor and figurative artist renowned for inventing ambivalent forms that combine fine art and craft. She creates pieces from a vast array of materials, adopting ready-made elements that she freely assembles. She also incorporates modelling, carving, painting, and other finishes into her works.

Pilkington has had three solo shows at Marlborough Fine Art, London: Thing-Soul White (2014), Peaceable Kingdom (2010), and Elephant (2007). Other recent exhibitions include Thirteen Blackbirds Looked at a Man at Chapter Arts Centre, Cardiff (2015), and The Value of the Paw at the V&A Museum of Childhood (2012). Her work is held in the collections of the Deste Foundation (Athens), Manchester City Art Gallery, and the David Roberts Collection. In 2014 she was elected a Royal Academician, and was awarded the Sunny Dupree Award for her work Reclining Doll. In 2016 she became the Professor of Sculpture at the Royal Academy Schools.



Stephanie Quayle studied sculpture at the Slade School of Art and at the Royal College of Art, London. She has long been fascinated with the animal form, and creates expressive life-size sculptures fired in clay that capture the movement and character of the creature, from imposing elephants to mischievous monkeys.

In 2016, her work was exhibited in the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition and in a group show of women artists entitled Champagne Life at the Saatchi Gallery. Boo Saville makes work that spans both abstraction and figuration and that responds to internet-found images. She is currently working on large colour field paintings shown alongside found-image-based black and white figurative paintings. She is well known for her use of biros and has made paintings using clothes due, bleach, and ink.

She has shown in Milan; Paris; Hong Kong; Berlin; The Museum of Contemporary Art, Toronto; and the Museum of New and Old Art, Tazmania. Saville has been featured in Francesca Gavin's book Hell Bound: New Gothic Art (2008), and in 100 New Artists (2011), as well as in

Anthropology, archaeology, and anatomy provide inspiration for her work, manifesting in an array of media from performance, installation, photography, and drawing, to painting, bookmaking, and the Italian tradition of the handmade.

At the heart of Amy Stephens' minimally precise artwork is the symbiotic relationship between nature and human agency, and between seduction and control. Her process relies upon appropriating existing objects from previous artworks, thereby forcing the work to resist the finite. The assemblages utilise wood, plaster, metal, and Perspex, strongly suggesting urban living. She carefully sources and chooses each material to create equilibrium between tone and structure. Her works' investigations of line, colour, texture, and form reflect a confident aesthetic inspired by architecture and design.

Stephens has had solo exhibitions in Stockholm, Canada, Dublin, London, and Buenos Aires. Her work can be seen in public collections in the UK, Ireland, Poland, and Italy. She is a member of the Royal British Society of Sculptors and the Contemporary Art Society in London.





Gavin Turk has pioneered many forms of contemporary British sculpture now taken for granted, including painted bronzes, waxworks, recycled art-historical icons, and the use of rubbish in art. His installations and sculptures explore issues of authorship, authenticity, and identity. Concerned with the 'myth' of the artist and the 'authorship' of a work, his engagement with this debate stretches back to the ready-mades of Marcel Duchamp.

In 1991, the Royal College of Art refused Turk a degree on the basis that his final show, Cave, consisted of a whitewashed studio space containing only a blue heritage plaque that read, 'Gavin Turk worked here

1989-91.'The installation gained him notoriety, and his work has since been collected and exhibited by major museums and galleries throughout the world. His recent commissions include the public sculptures $L'\hat{A}ge\ d'Or$ (2016) in London's Olympic Park, and Nail, a 12-metre sculpture next to St Paul's Cathedral in London.

Warren was nominated for the Turner Prize in 2006 and the Vincent Award in 2008. In 2009, a major exhibition of her work was held at London's Serpentine Gallery, and she was also included in the 54th International Art Exhibition - la Biennale di Venezia. Hugo Wilson is a British artist who works across a range of media, including painting, drawing, sculpture, and printmaking. His work explores issues of faith and belief and the associated structures of power, incorporating his wide-ranging interests in science, religion, culture, history, and memory. While he reveres the virtuosi of the Western artistic canon, his work suggests both a devotion to and subversion of this tradition.

Wilson has been included in shows from South Korea to Hungary, and is in private and public collections internationally, including the New York Public Library, The Library of Congress, Washington, and the Deutsche Bank Collection. He has had solo exhibitions at Parafin in London, Project B in Milan, and Mihai Nicodim Gallery in Los Angeles. His solo exhibition at Galerie Judin in Berlin opens in May 2017.

Rose Wylie studied at Folkstone and Dover School of Art, and at the Royal College of Art. All of her work centres on painting and drawing.

In 2010, she was Great Britain's sole representative in *Women To Watch*, National Museum of Women in the Arts, Washington D.C. Working in traditional and non-traditional materials, his work has explored myriad narratives, including the modern-day obsession with social media, actors in character, the pervasiveness of pornography, cosmetic surgery, and the representation of political figures.

His work has been exhibited all over the world and has been the subject of major retrospectives at the National Portrait Gallery in London and at other museums in the U.K. and abroad. His recent series of paintings of model and actress Cara Delevingne was exhibited at the Museum of National History in Denmark, and a portrait of Kevin Spacey in his role as President Frank Underwood was unveiled at the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery in Washington DC in 2016.
